It supports family caregivers to fulfil their roles and achieve peace of mind, when their loved ones are nearing the end of life. She also teaches end-of-life and grief counselling in the Master of Gerontology and Master of Counselling programmes with the Singapore University of Social Sciences.



Priscilla Tor, Counselling and Care Centre

She has a Graduate Diploma in Social Work and Graduate Diploma in Counselling Practice. Presently, she is supporting clients who experience burn-out, caregiving stress, grief and loss, depression, trauma, anxiety and relationship issues with individuals and groups and families. She has worked in different settings in community work, rehabilitative setting, family service centres and social enterprises.



Julia Lee, Senior Director, TOUCH Professional Deputies & Donees (PDD)

Julia Lee holds a Masters in Health Science (Gerontology) and Bachelors in Social Work. She is a registered social worker in the field of eldercare. She spearheaded PDD, which is a team of proxy decision-makers who step in to make important decisions on behalf of individuals who lack the mental capacity to do so. She has contributed to the appointment of TOUCH Senior Activity Centre as the Centre of Specialisation by NCSS, in view of its good work in meeting the needs of the elderly.

Why join this course?

OACIF is built on the foundations of Systemic Theory, which encourages practitioners to go beyond “talking to a client” and towards “influencing a family system”. **CCC is at the forefront of this practice in Singapore.**

While the course does indeed touch on care, it goes beyond seeing individuals as a singular unit of care and adopts a holistic approach, teaching participants to understand the dynamics between family members and the relationship between those dynamics and caregiving.

The training provides a deeper level of professional development by emphasising self-reflexivity; participants would gain an insight into how their own family history and biases would affect their practice.



AVAILABLE FUNDING GRANT
